This year's GALA luncheon, which kicks the whole week of festivities off, will feature the man who has, over the past fifty years, designed interiors for the truly rich and famous – a short list would include Mariah Carey, Henry Ford II, Malcolm Forbes, Barbara Walters, Nelson Doubleday, Mr. and Mrs. S.I. Newhouse, Charlotte Ford and Billy Joel – the Prince of Chintz himself, Mario Buatta. Mr. Buatta's keynote will educate, inform and amuse you to no end, and warm you up for all of the treasures you'll find at the 2014 GALA's live and silent auctions.

#### Adrian Villeta: Romantic Portraitist February 2-May 4, 2014 Gloria Vanderbilt, Guest Curator

Artist, author, actress and fashion icon Gloria Vanderbilt will be the guest curator of *Adrián Villeta: Romantic Portraitist*, an exhibition of 39 photographs–including the stunning image of Vanderbilt below– spanning 30 years in the professional career of this renowned artist.

"Adrián Villeta draws us into a sacred place where our spirit is restored by the beauty of his vision. Let yourself be drawn into these images, where you'll find the heart of Adrián Villeta, and in so doing, discover a magical world...perhaps discover secrets about yourself," said Vanderbilt.

HMA Executive Director Christopher J. Madkour invited Vanderbilt, who has known Adrián Villeta and his work for many years, to be the guest curator in order for the public to experience his vision as filtered through the eyes of another artist.

Born in San Juan, Puerto Rico, Villeta considers himself a portrait artist, more than simply a photographer, in the style of the great masters of the genre such as British artist Julia Margaret Cameron and American artist John Singer Sargent. He combines painting and photography to capture in his work the grace and

elegance of a bygone era, while celebrating the modern virtues of strength, independence and self confidence in his subjects.

"In my portraits, the subject is 'welcomed into my world' to become a character in it. Then, I seek to impart my stamp by making sure all elements of the portrait surroundings, light, flowers, decorative objects and clothing work in perfect harmony as a whole," said the artist.

He first gets to know his sitters, talking with them in his French formal garden at his home in San Juan. Each photograph is later printed on black and white on fiber paper or c print (matte

finish) with sepia tone and then hand painted in oil. His photos are based on a strict study. Through his in-depth analysis of various elements, such as light, color and atmosphere, and an insistent search

to show unique details, each work is presented as a reality in itself.

The past is just the basis for displaying a world of elegance, romance and glamour.

# Encounters: Rocío Rodríguez

January 25-May 18

Encounters, the museum's awardwinning regional art series, has presented many of the region's best contemporary artists over the past 27 years. In January 2014, it returns with signature abstract drawings and paintings by acclaimed Atlanta artist Rocío Rodríguez.

Born in Cuba, Rodríguez immigrated to the United States with her family as a child. Although she has lived in this country for more than 50 years, she considers herself culturally to be a Cuban-American, and her biculturalism to be a gift that allows her to approach art-making from more than one perspective.

During her 30-year career, Rodríguez has created engaging works from representational to abstract. In this showing, she debuts her most recent works. Her intriguing new series deconstructs

the very language of painting, breaking down the individual components of line, shape, color and texture and reordering them in ways that question the fixed boundaries between abstract and representational space.

"Drawing is the crucible for my ideas—the DNA of my paintings" said Rodríguez. "If the studio was burning down, I would rescue my drawings first."

The paintings which evolved from her drawings were primarily executed during a particularly creative period in 2013. Of these works, Rodríguez said, "I am asking myself what is the relevance of painting today? What is painting to me? I think these new works are like memorials to painting...making paintings about painting."



### YAM 2014: Exhibition for Youth Art Month

#### March 9-April 13

"Every child is an artist. The problem is how to remain an artist once we grow up." – Pablo Picasso

Help us celebrate and appreciate the works of our youth and encourage them to keep creating as we present our annual Youth Art Month, or YAM, exhibition of student artwork. This year marks the 27th annual YAM exhibition and will once again showcase nearly 200 exuberant works by youth in kindergarten through grade 12 from Huntsville City, Madison City, Madison County, Athens City, Limestone County, Decatur City, and Scottsboro City Schools.

Also on display in the Great Hall from March 9 through March 13 will be the Visual Arts Achievement Program (VAA) winners. The works of 17 middle and high school students from Alabama's District V will be selected as Blue Ribbon Finalists. After their display in Huntsville, the works will travel to Montgomery to be displayed at the Alabama State Council on the Arts with other regional winners from across the state.

In addition, don't miss the winning work from the Congressional Art Competition, selected from high school students in the 5th Congressional District, which will be on display from March 9 through April 13 in the museum's Salmon Gallery. This piece will later travel to Washington D.C. for a yearlong display at the U.S. Capitol. Youth Art Month is observed nationally each March to emphasize the value of art education for children and to encourage public support for quality school art programs. It is endorsed by The National Art Education Association, Alabama Art Education Association, Alabama State Department of Education, Alabama Alliance for Arts Education and locally by the Huntsville-Madison County Art Education Association.

# Mario Buatta Gala luncheon with renowned NYC designer


Mario Buatta is one of America's foremost decorators. He was born in New York, studied architecture at Cooper Union and attended Parsons School of Design in Europe. After an apprenticeship in the decorating department of B. Altman & Co., he became associated with several decorating firms including Elisabeth Draper, Inc. and then formed his own decorating company.

Mr. Buatta, also known as "the Prince of Chintz", explains that, "A house should grow in the same way that an artist's painting grows. A few dabs today, a few more tomorrow and the rest when the spirit moves you. When the painting is completed (as no room ever should be), it never reflects the artist's original conception. A room should come together through this process, as the people living in it grow, and where their needs and paths take them, in order to achieve the ultimate timeless undecorated look."

Private clients include Mariah Carey, Henry Ford II, Malcolm Forbes, Barbara Walters, Nelson Doubleday, Mr. and Mrs. S.I. Newhouse, Charlotte Ford and Billy Joel. His commercial design contracts include the executive offices of the Metropolitan Opera House at Lincoln Center in New York, and the decoration and design of the Henry Francis du Pont Winterthur Museum Galleries at Wilmington, Delaware which houses their line of reproductions. He has completed the redecoration of Blair House, the official White House Guest House in Washington, D.C.



From the sacred to the secular, to the most essential questions about politics and society, she has tackled big ideas with panache, combining the lighthearted and the profound, at once playful and mind provoking.

During the last 30 years, Edwina has created art of international acclaim that includes sculpture, paintings, collage and works on paper. Early in her career, for the 1979 United Nations' Year of the Child, she created three monumental sculptures, which are now installed at UN centers in New York, Geneva and Vienna. A decade later, she used

Oates has penned bestselling novels, critically acclaimed collections of short fiction, as well as essays, plays, poetry, and a recent memoir. Writing in *The Nation*, critic Henry Louis Gates, Jr. said, "A future archaelogist equipped only with her oeuvre could easily piece together the whole of postwar America." In 2010, reflecting the widespread esteem in which her work is held, President Barack Obama awarded Oates the National Humanities Medal.

Best known for her fiction, Oates' novels include *Them*, which won the


ouise Kerz Hirschfeld serves as President of the Al Hirschfeld Foundation, which honors her late husband and his artwork. Ms. Hirschfeld oversees new exhibitions, supervises publications, directs educational programs and leads philanthropic endeavors. Recently, Ms. Hirschfeld organized "Brits on Broadway" in London, "Hirschfeld on Shaw" for Canada's Shaw Festival and "Hirschfeld on Tennessee Williams," a centenary exhibition in New Orleans in 2011. One of the most exciting ventures is "The Al Hirschfeld Project," a curriculum for teaching the arts in New York City public schools. She has served as

dismantled sections of the Berlin Wall to create an extraordinary sculpture, *Breakthrough*, now permanently at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri. Later, Edwina created *BreakFree*, also cut out from the Berlin Wall, which was installed in the Freedom Court at the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library at Hyde Park, NY.

Today her works are mainly large-scale metal sculptures, which include her iconic *Eve's Apple* and her *Sunflower Woman*, commissioned by Henry Buhl for his celebrated Sunflower

Collection.

Edwina Sandys was born and raised in London. In 1969 she considered standing for Parliament, which placed her squarely within her family's tradition. Not only was her father the British Cabinet Minister, Duncan Sandys, but her grandfather was Winston Churchill. It is telling that these major political figures were both talented artists.

Sandys will have a selection of silkscreen prints and two small sculptures on display at the museum during her visit.

National Book Award; Blonde, a bold reimagining of the inner life of Marilyn Monroe; The Falls, which won France's Prix Femina; The Gravedigger's Daughter and Little Bird of Heaven; and We Were the Mulvaneys, which was selected by Oprah's Book Club. Her most recent works include Mudwoman, Black Dahlia & White Rose, Daddy Love and The Accursed. Her next books will be a novel, Carthage (January 2014) and High Lonesome: New and Selected Stories 1966-2006 which includes Oates' most anthologized short story, "Where Are You Going, Where Have You Been?" Inspired by a song by Bob Dylan, it was later adapted as a film, Smooth Talk.

Since 1963, forty of Oates's books have been included on *The New* York Times list of notable books of the year. Among her many honors are two O. Henry Prizes and two Bram Stoker Awards, the PEN/Malamud Award for Excellence in Short Fiction, World Fantasy Award, and M. L. Rosenthal Award from the National Institute of Arts and Letters. In 2009, Oates was given the Ivan Sandrof Lifetime Achievement Award by the National Book Critics Circle. In 2012, she was awarded both the Mailer Prize for Lifetime Achievement and the PEN Center USA Award for Lifetime Achievement.

picture editor and essayist for several publications, including, *Hirschfeld on Line*, and *Hirschfeld's British Aisles*. Ms. Hirschfeld is also an amateur photographer whose work was exhibited at New York's Leica Gallery in 2002 and 2008. In collaboration with her Co-Chair, Arthur Gelb of *The New York Times*, and producer Roccco Landesman, she secured the ultimate Broadway tribute for her late husband ... the renaming of the Martin Beck Theatre to the Al Hirschfeld Theatre.

David Leopold is an author and curator who has organized exhibitions for institutions around the country including the Library of Congress, and

internationally for venues such as the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. More than twenty years ago, he began a correspondence with Hirschfeld. They soon met and David was asked to organize the archives of Hirschfeld's work.

Leopold now works for the Al Hirschfeld Foundation, organizing exhibitions of Hirschfeld's art all over the world. He continues to uncover and document Hirschfeld's prodigious output, which is now shared with the world through the Foundation's website, AlHirschfeldFoundation. org. He continues curating a wide range of exhibitions of other artists for institutions around the country, and writing books on subjects from Irving Berlin to editorial cartoons.



# Realistic Watercolor Landscapes with Alan P. Shuptrine

Skill Level: Beginner to Advanced

Learn how to create a dramatic landscape using the two main watercolor techniques, as well as additional techniques of your own. Using "wet-in-wet" mostly for backgrounds and detailed "drybrush" technique in the foregrounds, Alan Shuptrine will teach students how to literally "sculpt" the landscape from back to front.

Over the past 27 years, Shuptrine has emerged as a leading practitioner in several artistic disciplines, including watercolor, drybrush watercolor, egg tempera, oil, the centuries-old art of water gilding with genuine gold leaf, and wood carving, to name a few. 
