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Dear Museum Members,

It was a September afternoon when I boarded my TWA flight at New York's JFK airport in 1981. I had recently graduated from Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, NY, and was embarking on my new life as a graduate student in the Islamic Art and Architecture Department at the American University in Cairo, Egypt. My years in Egypt gave me the unique opportunity to reinforce my lifelong fascination with that part of the world. From Khartoum, where the Blue and White Nile converge, to the Mediterranean, to

exploring the religious and cultural sites of Jerusalem, Damascus, Aleppo, Petra and Istanbul, my travels to those mesmerizing destinations enriched my mind and nurtured my soul.

Egyptology, the study of pharaonic Egypt, spanning the period c.4500 BC to 641 AD began when the scholars accompanying Napoleon Bonaparte's invasion of Egypt (1798-1801) published *Description de l'Égypte* (1809-28), which made source material about ancient Egypt available to Europeans. Napoleon's invasion, though a military failure, created a fascination with the exotic world of Egypt, North Africa and the Levant. Europeans were enthralled with tales of the harems in the Ottoman courts, paintings of the Holy Land, and adventurers' writings of their travels across the vast Sahara Desert of North Africa. The Orient, as it was then referred to, presented a perfect artistic backdrop for many European and some American artists who made the long, arduous journey for art's sake. They painted the vibrant, colorful souks, the breathtaking sunrises over ancient monuments, the caravans of horses and camels carrying textiles, spices and other rare goods across the remote deserts. These images were part of the artistic phenomena, of "Orientalism"

"Orientalism" is the theme of a rare exhibition that will be on loan from the Dahesh Museum of Art in New York City, this October. The exhibition, Orientalism: The Allure of the North Africa and the Near East, has been in the planning stages for seven years and this will be the first time it has traveled to the southeast. It will be a rare occasion for our members and guest to view a show specifically focused on images of North Africa and the Near East, by noted 19th century artists. Special guest, curator Alia Nour, from the Dahesh Museum of Art, and also an alumna of the American University in Cairo, has conducted

extensive research in this area of focus. I am delighted that Alia accepted my invitation to be our guest speaker at the opening on Tuesday, October 29.

From the exotic exhibition of "Orientalism" opening in October 29, to highlights of the political world stage by award-winning PBS News Hour, correspondent John Yang, on November 7, the Voices of Our Times series begins its eighth year of bringing people of note in the arts, academia, publishing and politics to the Huntsville Museum of Art. I wish to express my gratitude to HMA member Wendy Yang, for suggesting her brother, John Yang, as a possible guest speaker in the series. There is no doubt that John will share great insight into the political and social dynamics unfolding on the world stage today.

As you read this current issue of *ArtViews*, I would like to say how grateful I am to the Board of Trustees, volunteers and, most importantly, the dedicated staff who have each year orchestrated a staggering number of fine exhibitions, workshops, Skating in the Park, GALA, and *Voices* series, to name a few of our impressive offerings. To this end, I am humbled by everyone's generous gift of time and resources to raise us to greater heights.

Orientalism: The Allure of North Africa and the Near East Masterworks from the Dahesh Museum of Art

orientalism: The Allure of North Africa and the Near East – Masterworks from the Dahesh Museum of Art explores how artists from both Europe and America represented the cultures and peoples of Turkey, the Middle East, and North Africa – both real and imagined – during the 19th century.

Western encounters with the Orient did not stop with the fall of the Roman Empire, but, by the 19th century, the Industrial Revolution had laid the foundations for dynamic new levels of political and economic engagement. Improved and recently invented forms of transportation created a flood of travelers – writers, scholars and, most crucially, artists – headed for the Orient.

The Orient enchanted Romantic artists who wanted to escape Europe's urban rigors, Realists who sought to record the "authentic" Orient, and others simply in search of fresh subject matter to satisfy the demands of a changing Western art market. Some traveled to the region as part of official government missions, others accompanied wealthy patrons, or were hired by the local elites and royalty.

Artists who did not make the journey rendered an imaginary Orient inspired by translated Arabic texts – especially *The One Thousand and One Nights* (1704-1717) – as well as the emergence of many contemporary Western literary and

travel accounts, including Lady Mary Wortely Montagu's *Turkish Embassy Letter* (1763), and Victor Hugo's Les Orientales (1829). After 1839, photographers provided increased and readily available documentation for artists, scholars, and armchair travelers, as well as souvenirs of famous sites.

Drawn from the Dahesh Museum of Art, the Mervat Zahid Cultural Foundation, and a private collection, Orientalism: The Allure of North Africa and the Near East – Masterworks from the Dahesh Museum of Art features over 50 exceptional paintings, sculptures, and lavishly illustrated books by artists from Europe and America, such as Hermann David Solomon Corrodi, Rudolf Ernst, Ludwig Deutsch, Charles-Théodore Frère, Joseph Farquharson, Frederic Lord Leighton, Edwin Longsden Long, Émile Prisse d'Avennes, Owen Jones, and Frederick Arthur Bridgman.

The exhibition explores the artistic legacy of Western encounters with the Orient in the 19th century through a variety of themes ranging from the West's fascination with Ancient Egypt, Medieval Islamic architecture and design, and the exploration of biblical history, to exotic genre and harem scenes. The stories unfolded by the artists' travels reveal the cross-cultural exchanges that continue to fascinate us two centuries later.

he Huntsville Museum of Art is pleased to present the sixth installment of its exhibition series focused on contemporary artists linked in terms of subject matter and sensibility. Connections: Stephen Paul Day | Sibylle Peretti showcases two New Orleans artists whose works examine aspects of childhood and nature as symbols of innocence and fragility. Day's nostalgic paintings and sculptures mine his boyhood obsessions and often celebrate antiquities and fairy tales.

Peretti's dreamlike sculptures and wall pieces focus on children intertwined with elements of the natural world, and are fraught with danger and promise. Both artists are interested in conveying a deep psychological narrative through their works, which are simultaneously charming, disturbing, and haunting.

Stephen Paul Day is a conceptual artist who works in an array of media including bronze, steel, glass, and wood to create discreet pieces, as well as multimedia installations. He began his artistic training at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in

Paris, with his main teacher a master craftsman in architectural glass who made Matisse's works in the south of France. Since then, he has held residencies at the Experimental Workshop, Pilchuck Glass School, Wheaton Arts, and the Kohler Arts Center, among others, and has exhibited and taught worldwide.

Sibvlle Peretti is internationally acclaimed for her work in glass. She received her MFA in Sculpture and Painting from the Academy of Fine Arts in Cologne and a Master in Glass Making & Design from the State School of Glass in Zwiesel, Germany. Reframed: American Women from the Sellars Collection October 13, 2019-January 12, 2020 Chan Gallery

The permanent collection of the Huntsville Museum of Art was dramatically enhanced in 2008 by the acquisition of the Sellars Collection of Art by American Women. This landmark gathering of historical works celebrates the achievements of over 100 talented female artists active between approximately 1850 and 1940.

The Museum has recently launched a project to commission handcarved and gilded period reproduction frames for key works in this Collection. To date, 24 watercolors, oils and pastels have been transformed through the endeavor. *Reframed* will provide the public with an opportunity to encounter all of these works displayed together for the first time.

Museum Acquires Painting in Memory of Lil Parton

The Huntsville Museum of Art is pleased to announce that it has purchased a watercolor painting in memory of Lil Parton, longtime Facility Manager at the Museum. The work, titled *Evening White*, is by Alan Shuptrine, a Southern realist artist acclaimed for his precisely rendered style. Shuptrine trained at the Baylor School in Chattanooga, the University of the South, and the University of Tennessee. He draws inspiration from the drybrush techniques of his father, noted American watercolorist Hubert Shuptrine. He is also a skilled master gilder.

Of this particular work, the artist notes: "I grew up in a few Southern towns along the Appalachian Mountains; and I lived in Montgomery, Huntsville, and Birmingham, in the foothills of Alabama. The summer nights were warm and humid; and when it finally cooled off enough to make dew on the grass, we would sit out on the porch and listen to the katydids. That's when I could smell the magnolias on the side yard. The crisp leaves would clack in the darkness and a delightful breeze would usher in that familiar lemony white linen scent. I can go back there if I just close my eyes – the bright white blossoms dancing in a sea of dark green and darkness."

gold leaf water-gilded frame, is currently on display through October 13 in the Haws Gallery as part of an exhibition of recent acquisitions.

P. Allen Smith, often described as one of America's most talented landscape designers, is the product of five generations of Southern nurserymen. His foundational childhood experiences in planting, naturally led to an appreciation for horticulture, genetic diversity, plant pairing and an orderly, holistic approach to work. Later as a graduate student in England he traced – 200 years to the day – Thomas Jefferson and John Adams's famous tour of important English country homes.

Historical precedent and context being ever prominent in his mind, Smith sidelines fashion and identifies and then sensitively accentuates the natural gifts of the landscape, imparting balance, harmony and beauty in the classic tradition of Palladio, Brown, Repton and Soane. His designs are an expression of his client's lifestyle, melding site with living material and improvements to create environments that mature and improve with the seasons while framing arresting viewsheds.

that received an Edward R. Murrow Award for Best Newscast.

Prior to joining NBC, Yang worked for ABC News, based in Washington, where he was the weekend White House correspondent, and in Jerusalem, where he served as the Middle East correspondent.

Yang has been part of teams that have been honored with an Emmy, two Peabody Awards and two Alfred I. DuPont-Columbia University Awards.

Yang's career also includes time at *The Washington Post, Wall Street Journal, TIME,* and *The Boston Globe.* He is a cum laude graduate of Wesleyan University.

was the youngest person ever nominated for an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress. During filming, Badham became particularly close to actor Gregory Peck, who played Scout's father, Atticus Finch. She kept in touch with him, and occasionally accompanied him on his one-man-show lecture tours and award ceremonies.

After To Kill a Mockingbird, 1962, she appeared in two other films, This Property is Condemned, 1966, with Robert Redford and Natalie Wood, and Let's Kill Uncle, 1966. She had TV appearances on Dr. Kildare "Sister Mike," 1963, and Twilight Zone "The Bewitchin' Pool," 1964, before retiring from acting to pursue life as a teenager.

In 2005, at the urging of actor/writer/director Cameron Watson, Badham came out of retirement to play an offbeat cameo opposite Keith Carradine for his film, *Our Very Own*.

Mary now maintains a busy schedule lecturing to audiences internationally about the book and the film. Her interest is in expanding knowledge about the film's message of social injustice and to ensure that each generation of students can experience the film's impact.

As of 2014, Badham was an art restorer and a college testing coordinator. She is married to Richard W. Wilt, dean of Library and Educational Support Services at Lehigh Carbon Community College, and the mother of two children. She has traveled around the world recalling her experiences making *To Kill a Mockingbird*.

In 2012, she attended a screening with President Barack Obama at the White House to mark the 50th anniversary of *To Kill a Mockingbira*. The Huntsville Museum of Art is honored to welcome Mary back to Alabama, the actress whose character helped define the thinking of a generation.

Allen's esoteric interests provide for a broad diversity of inclusions in his designs such as poultry houses, sheep pastures, walled gardens rooms, fruit orchards, herb gardens, container gardens, stumperies, rare rose collections, wildflower fields, pollinator drifts, apiaries, ponds, and follies. Many of these devices are on display at his Ferme Orneé, Moss Mountain Farm, a 600 acre estate on the Arkansas River.

Known for his television work on Good Morning America, The Today Show, his PBS programming, and his six book publications, Allen is also deeply passionate and involved with preservation and conservation efforts. He is a trustee of Winterthur House, a former board member of the Royal Oak Society (the British National Trust), a certified fellow of the Royal Horticultural Society, an honorary member of the Garden Club of America, the honorary President of the Herb Society of America, and a life member of the Livestock Conservancy, the Rare Breeds Trust (UK) and the Society for the

Preservation of Poultry Antiquities. He is a TEDx speaker and the founder of the Heritage Poultry Conservancy.

Langham has been named to *Elle Decor's* A List and *Architectural Digest's* AD 100 and is in high demand as a speaker on decorating around the country.

His book About Decorating – the Remarkable Rooms of Richard Keith Langham was published by Rizzoli in October 2017 and is in its third printing.

FEATURE ARTIST Ignat Ignatov

Ignat Ignatov (b. 1978) is a contemporary artist with exemplary talent. His interpretation of the spirit of fine art saturates his paintings with a unique expressive richness. Although each new subject seems to dictate the style and approach, his paintings are always alive with color, light, texture, atmosphere, energy and emotion.

Ignatov was born in Veliko Tarnovo and grew up in Sevlievo, Bulgaria. At age thirteen, his promising talent in drawing, painting and sculpting gained him one of only thirty positions to the renowned School of Arts in Tryavna, Bulgaria. In the 5 years there, he established the foundation of his academic art training. Following graduation in 1996, Ignatov was

accepted into the University of Arts in Veliko Tarnovo, Bulgaria where he studied under the demanding atelier approach to fine



art. In 1997, using proceeds from the sale of his art, Ignatov financed his move to the United States and is now a U.S. citizen living in southern California. He then studied at the prestigious California Art Institute in Westlake Village, Associates in Art in Sherman Oaks and the American Animation Institute in North Hollywood. In 2005 Ignatov began teaching painting classes at the Los Angeles Academy of Figurative Art where he taught till 2012.

In the course of establishing for his own "artistic roots", Ignatov was influenced by Nicolai Fechin, John Singer Sargent, Anders Zorn and Joaquin Sorolla. Ignatov's work includes figures, portraits, still lifes, and landscapes. His goal is to

continue to express the form and anatomy as well as color and composition through a representational painting approach.






