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
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

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Dear Museum Members,

No orman Rockwell. No other artist evokes as much American nostalgia as he does. For decades, his paintings appeared on the cover of *The Saturday Evening Post* with such regularity that he became the most famous illustrator of his day.

Our exhibition, Norman Rockwell: Behind the Camera, brings together original paintings, sketches and prints linked to the photographs that he staged with his models. He carefully orchestrated each element of his design for the camera before putting brush to canvas. Many of Rockwell's most recognizable paintings were created during his years in Arlington,

Vermont. By the 1940s, this small Vermont town became an "illustrator's colony" – Jack Atherton, Mead Schaeffer, George Hughes and Norman Rockwell, all made this town their home. Arlington would have the proud distinction of being home to four *Saturday Evening Post* illustrators. A few years later, Don Trachte, who created the comic strip character "Henry," made his home in Sandgate, just a few miles away.

Growing up in Manchester, Vermont, ten miles north of Rockwell's studio, friends of my parents who modeled for Rockwell often shared their wonderful stories with us. They would reminisce about going to his studio to pose for photographer Gene Pelham while Rockwell staged the set that his paintings would be based on. Gene was also a fine illustrator and artist in his own right, someone I knew during my time in Vermont. As visitors will see, this show features many of Gene's photographs.

One of my favorite Rockwell paintings is *The Gossips*. We are fotunate to have a sketch of this painting included in this exhibition. The original painting depicts many models who were patients of my father, a local dentist in Manchester. The first model at the top left of the painting, who initiates "the gossip" was Maude Vallee and the second model was Cordelia Comar whose family owned the historic Quality Restaurant in Manchester, where you could get the gooiest grilled cheese and the best root beer float in the Green Mountains!

Sadly, many of Rockwell's models are no longer with us to share their stories of posing for some of these iconic paintings. However, I am very fortunate that my parent's friend and former Rockwell model, Mary Walen Leonard, has accepted my invitation to speak at our Members' Lecture and Reception on November 9, about the time that she, and her mother and her brother Pete, posed for Rockwell in the years 1938-1953. This evening will be a rare opportunity for our members and guests to enjoy hearing Mary's life and times in Arlington, Vermont. Also speaking, Don Trachte, Jr., whose late father caused quite a sensation throughout the the art world when his

sons discovered Rockwell's original painting, *Breaking Home Ties*, behind a false wall in their father's studio. You will not want to miss Don's operatic family tale of love, betrayal and reward!

Painting a Nation

Hudson River School Landscapes from the Higdon Collection October 15, 2017 through January 7, 2018

Natives of New York, Ann and Lee Higdon developed an interest in art during their teenage years. They often visited museums and found themselves drawn to paintings of the Hudson River School. After marrying and purchasing a nineteenth-century home overlooking the Hudson River, they began to collect paintings of the Hudson River School in the 1980s. For nearly forty years, their interest in this artistic period has endured, resulting in the collection of works on view in this exhibition.

In the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, American artists looked to Europe for both aesthetic themes and painterly methods of depicting the world around them. This began to change in the early decades of the nineteenth century as artists adapted European aesthetics to develop a distinctly American landscape narrative. The name Hudson River School, originally intended to be disparaging, was coined to identify a group of landscape artists living in New York City, several of whom built homes on the Hudson River. The term has evolved beyond regional expression and is now generally accepted to describe nineteenth century American landscape painting.

Painting a Nation: Hudson River School Landscapes from the Higdon Collection features significant American artists from the Hudson River School, including Albert Bierstadt, William Bradford, Jasper Francis Cropsey, William Hart, William Trost Richards and many others. The majority of the works depict scenes of New York State and include paintings of the Hudson River, Lake George and the Adirondack Mountains region.

The second generation of Hudson River School painters – many of whose works are in the Higdon Collection – extended the visual vocabulary to include subjects along the Atlantic Coast and Far West, reflecting the expansion of the United States during the mid-nineteenth century. The Higdon Collection also includes a selection of still-life paintings that complement Hudson River landscape themes by interpreting nature in an indoor setting.

Together, these paintings celebrate the picturesque beauty of our nation and reflect the collective desire of the Hudson River painters to develop a uniquely American visual language, independent of European schools of painting.

Norman Rockwell: Behind the Camera

November 5, 2017-January 28, 2018

Norman Rockwell (1894-1978) was a 20th-century American author, painter and illustrator whose works appealed to a broad population in the United States for its reflection of American culture. Rockwell is most famous for the cover illustrations of everyday life he created for *The Saturday Evening Post* magazine over a period of nearly five decades.

In his teenage years, Rockwell became the art director of Boys' Life, the official publication of the Boy Scouts of America. At age 21, Rockwell set up a studio with the cartoonist Clyde Forsythe and in 1916, the 22-year-old Rockwell painted his first cover for The Saturday Evening Post. Over the next 47 years, another 321 Rockwell paintings would appear on the cover of the Post.

Early in his career, Rockwell would hire professional models to pose for the characters in his paintings. However, beginning in

the mid-1930s he embraced photography and began using friends and neighbors rather than professional models. For Rockwell, already known as "the kid with the camera eye," photography

was more than an artist's aid. The familiarity with his new subjects paired with the camera's ability to capture a fleeting expression or freeze a difficult pose, brought a new flesh-and-blood realism to his work and opened a window to the keenly observed authenticity that defines his art.

Norman Rockwell: Behind the Camera is the first exhibition to delve deeply into Rockwell's richly detailed study photographs, created by the artist as references for his iconic paintings.

Organized by author and guest curator, Ron Schick, the exhibition reveals a rarely seen, yet fundamental aspect of Rockwell's creative process. By unveiling a significant new body of Rockwell imagery in an unexpected medium, this exhibition showcases the behind-the-scenes shots as works of art themselves.

The exhibition, Norman Rockwell: Behind the Camera, is organized and circulated by


the Norman Rockwell Museum and brings together prints of Rockwell's study photographs and original paintings and drawings from their permanent collection.

Secrets Behind the Wall: The Don Trachte Replicas

Don Trachte was a cartoonist who became close friends with Norman Rockwell. In 1962, Trachte bought Rockwell's 1954 Saturday Evening Post cover painting, Breaking Home Ties, for \$900 and it quickly became his most prized possession. In 2002, he loaned Breaking Home Ties to an exhibition at the Norman Rockwell Museum. However, experts were puzzled over discrepancies between the loaned painting and the printed Saturday Evening Post cover.

In 2005, a year after Don's death, the Trachte family made a surprising discovery – a false wall was exposed in Trachte's studio concealing Rockwell's original painting along with seven other paintings by artists including Gene Pelham, Mead Schaeffer, Virginia Webb and George Hughes.

Trachte's sons believe he may have painted the nearly exact copies to prevent his estranged wife from ever obtaining the original artworks, which remained hidden for 32 years. In 2006, *Breaking Home Ties* sold for \$15.4 million, setting the record price for a Rockwell painting at that time. The current record is over \$46 million. The exhibition includes Trachte's replicas alongside many of the original paintings by beloved illustrators.

cut·Up/cut·Out

November 19, 2017-February 11, 2018

he art of cutting paper dates back thousands of years, with early artworks coming from 6th century China. Originally a decorative handcraft for women, Chinese paper-cutting eventually expanded into rural areas, becoming a staple at religious ceremonies and festivals. By the 14th century, paper-cutting spread to the rest of the world bringing in a new wave of folk art traditions. Cut Ut/Cut Out honors both innovation and tradition with a selection of over 50 artists representing diverse styles and techniques by taking a contemporary view of an ancient art practice that has evolved over thousands of years.

Cut Up/Cut Out is an exhibition of local, national and international artists who explore the captivating methods of decorative piercing and cutting, using a wide range of media from paper and plastic to metal and rubber. The transformative nature of cutting into and through a surface provides endless possibilities for converting the material from opaque to transparent, from flat to sculptural, from rigid to delicate, and from ordinary to exquisite. The process and precision required for this method of art-making is laborious, technically demanding and always astonishing.


Visually diverse, the artworks in Cut Up/Cut Out range in size from an intimate three inches to sprawling and complex installations, and they represent an abundance of conceptual ideas. The artists address our relationship with nature and environmental issues, personal and political narratives, architecture, fantasy, and abstract or formal ideas—with many intersections.

This show features several large scale installations including: Margaret Griffith's Coringa, a hand-cut, 12-foot long paper artwork that cascades from the ceiling, Adriane Colburn's expansive multimedia piece Forest for the Trees, and a sitespecific, interactive installation by Los Angeles artist Rebecca Niederlander. Cut Up/Cut Out also includes a group of artists who are drawn to cutting into unique or unusual materials such as tires, oil drums, and leaves.

The curator of this exhibition. Carrie Lederer, was inspired by Bay Area artist, Irene Pijoan's (1953-2004) groundbreaking large-scale cut paper artwork and has dedicated Cut Ub/Cut Out to her memory. Cut Up/Cut Out is a traveling exhibition that was organized by the Bedford Gallery and will travel nationally through 2020.



he Huntsville Museum of Art is pleased to present the fifth installment of its new Connections exhibition series focused on contemporary artists linked in terms of subject matter and sensibility. Connections: Hoss Haley | George Peterson | Tom Shields showcases three artists from western North Carolina who recycle and transform discarded materials into stunning works of art.

Hoss Haley crumples and re-assembles sheets of metal stripped from old appliances into stunning modernist forms and is regionally acclaimed for his striking works. Self-taught artist, George Peterson, carves and paints scrapped skateboard decks, changing them into primitive, handcrafted wall artifacts. Tom Shields has been working with wood for nearly twenty years. He explores furniture as a subject rather than an object, melding old and broken chairs and tables into complex visual forms with potent narrative potential.

In memory of Pat Kyser

It is well-known that the Huntsville Museum of Art strives to bring people and art together through acquiring, preserving, exhibiting and interpreting the highest quality works of art. This mission is based on two beliefs: an understanding that the arts enrich lives; and that visual ideas are best perceived, understood and enjoyed through first-hand experience of original artistic achievement.

To achieve this mission, the Museum offers a wide range of public programs to stimulate interest and understanding of the visual arts, including workshops, films, lectures and guided tours. However, none of the Museum's efforts would be possible without the passionate support of community members. One such supporter, the late Mrs.

Patricia (Pat) Flynn Kyser, was a true advocate of the arts and a devoted patron of the Huntsville Museum of Art.

Pat and her late husband, James Burley "Jim" Kyser, moved to Huntsville in 1975 and made it their permanent home where she became known widely as a teacher and designer of unique quilts. Pat founded the Alabama Chapter of the Embroiderers' Guild of America (EGA) in 1977 and served as its president the first four years and again from 2011-2013.

Also in 1977, she was asked to design, and over subsequent years produce, historic needlework kits for the Hermitage, President Andrew Jackson's home in Nashville. Believing in historic preservation, she was a long time member of the Tennessee Valley Civil War Round Table. She also helped found the Tennessee Valley Region EGA. She was a charter member of the Tennessee Valley Quilt Association, as well as the Heritage

Ouilters of Huntsville.

Pat's children, Jeff, Diana and Cindy Kyser, attribute their love for education and creativity to their mother. "Our mother believed in exploring her world and exposing her

children to as much of it as possible. She took us to art museums, churches, national parks, historical sites, and any event that celebrated local culture. We were encouraged to explore, learn, and create – to not be afraid to try something different and to use our talents to make

our own corner of the world a better place."

Throughout her 27 years of involvement, Pat generously supported the Museum's Membership and Annual Giving programs, as well as various Exhibitions and Capital Campaigns. She also showcased her quilt collection on numerous occasions here at the Museum.

She was the subject of a prestigious *Encounters* solo exhibition in 1994, and also a Merit Award Winner in the 1996 Red Clay Survey Exhibition of Contemporary Southern Art. In 2014, Pat donated one of her quilts, *Thanksgiving*, 1902, to the Museum's permanent collection.

The Board of Directors are honored to share that Pat's love and support of the Museum will continue in perpetuity through an incredible

> gift of \$100,000 that she bequeathed to the Huntsville Museum of Art. This gift was designated to our Programs Endowment (also supported by Patsy and Frank Haws, and Doris and Stan Minkinow) which allows for the Museum to showcase traveling exhibitions to our community that would otherwise remain unseen. "We are grateful for Pat's generous support and are honored to remember her legacy at the Huntsville Museum of Art in this way," said HMA Executive Director Christopher Madkour.

According to her children, "She gave freely of her time, her resources and her talents. Her family and friends have many tangible memories of her, as we have all been the recipient of a multitude of hand-made gifts that were crafted by our mother, with love."

Chairman of the Board of Directors, Richard Crunkleton, noted, "Pat's actions in support of the

Museum further illustrate the ideals she instilled into her children and her investment in the arts will forever impact the cultural enrichment of the city she loved, through both her captivating quilts and her generous financial investments."



John recounted his days at the Nixon White House and Watergate in two books: Blind Ambition (1976) and Lost Honor (1982). After retiring from a business career as a private investment banker doing middle-market mergers and acquisitions, he returned to fulltime writing and lecturing, including as a columnist for FindLaw's Writ (from 2000 to 2010) and Justia's Verdict (since 2010). His most recent bestseller, The Nixon Defense: What He Knew and When He Knew It (2014), is currently being developed by Entertainment One and ABC Television into an eight or ten-hour miniseries entitled "Watergate."

While in the US Air Force, General Carns served as Commander of the 13th Air Force, Deputy Commander in Chief for the US Pacific Forces, Director of the Joint Staff, Joint Chiefs of Staff, during the first Gulf War and the Panama Invasion, and retired from the USAF after serving as Vice Chief of Staff in 1994.

General Carns has authored a number of articles and participated in numerous studies on current issues, including such topics as the need to substantially alter the military acquisition process; undertaking a new energy strategy in the Department of Defense; the benefits of privatizing selective military logistics functions; the role of the military warfighter; the critical role of a credible US nuclear deterrent; applying energy efficiency standards to weapons system effectiveness, and improving the efficiency and effectiveness of the Defense acquisition process.

General Carns and his wife, Victoria, have two children. Colonel Michelle C. Carns, USAF, is currently assigned to Doha, Qatar; Major Marc G. Carns, USAF, JA, is currently assigned to 24th US Air Force, San Antonio, Texas. The Carns's reside in Pebble Beach, California.



Thanks in large part to her husband, who is a native of the "City by the Sea," Pardee authored two books about Newport, Private Newport: At Home and in the Garden; and Living Newport: Houses, People, Style. She is also an editor of the website PrivateNewport.com, as well as a garden furniture designer, national lecturer and authority on entertaining.

Bettie was recognized as an honoree for the second year on "The Salonniere 100:

America's Best Party Hosts," and also served as the host and creative producer of the thirteen-part PBS series *The Presidential Palate: Entertaining at the White House.* Bettie Pardee's books will be available for purchase at the luncheon.
