# Encounters: Jared Small

Southern Moments in Time February 3-May 19, 2019 | Grisham Gallery

he latest exhibition in this long-standing showcase for outstanding regional contemporary art focuses on the haunting works of this emerging artist from Memphis, Tennessee. Small has gained critical acclaim for his unique paintings on panel and vellum that are generally focused on arresting and dream-like portraits, arrangements of flowers floating in ethereal spaces, and stately, yet dilapidated, Southern homes existing in ambiguity. The artist is essentially self-taught and considered a prodigy.

Small describes his practice as trying to imagine other people's memories memories that are fading, but still there. Working from photographs, as well as from his imagination, he paints in a style similar to magic realism, with the center of each composition focused on a painstakingly accurate image while the background often dissolves into abstract elements. This technique allows the artist to hypnotize the viewer into a dreamlike state, caught between the realities of the obvious and the mysteries that seem to exist. beneath the surface.

Small's ability to detail exactly what he sees is most clearly evident in his portraits. Whether painting a worldly octogenarian or a child on

the cusp of adolescence, he always captures the essence of each individual's distinctive character. By contrast, his architectural paintings are devoid of people – as if a human presence might reveal too much of the story. The artist may include flowers in the yard or a sliver of curtain in a window to suggest that these decaying structures are still inhabited, but he never reveals any more. In an article in the *Memphis Commercial Appeal*, Andria Lisle describes this captivating approach as similar to the mysterious obsession with the vernacular of the South. She writes, "Small's impetus to find beauty in the dilapidation is, likewise, a purely Southern sentiment that's most often manifested in photographs of kudzu-overtaken barns and

rusted tractors."

A native and lifelong resident of Memphis, Small attended Overton High School and the University of Memphis, and has participated in numerous exhibitions in the region. His work may be found in many private and corporate collections, as well as the permanent collections of the Huntsville Museum of Art and the Memphis Brooks Museum of Art. *Encounters: Jared Small* – *Southern Moments in Time* is the artist's first major museum exhibition.

# Our Shared Heritage: Alabama Artists from the Collection Chan Gallery

Alabama, they say, is like one big front porch where folks gather on summer nights to tell tales and talk family. — Kathryn Tucker Windham

During the run of *Our Shared Heritage*, the Chan Gallery will become a microcosm of Alabama as seen through the eyes of artists past and present who have captured the people, places and traditions of our state. From the Gulf Coast in the south, through the Black Belt of mid-state, to the red clay hills of the north, a diverse culture emerges. Viewers will quickly sense the many connections between the land, the people, and everyday life here in the Heart of Dixie.

As a component of the statewide celebration of Alabama's 200 Bicentennial Celebration in 2019, *Our Shared Heritage* will highlight important works from the Museum's collection by artists with strong Alabama ties. Oil paintings, watercolors, drawings, prints, photographs, and other media by over 50 of the state's best artists from the 19th century to the present will be displayed. Old favorites, along with rarely shown works will include early portraits by William Frye, Nicola Marschall, William Halsey, and Adrian Thompson; mid-20th century

paintings, photographs and works on paper by Anne Wilson Goldthwaite, William Christenberry, Kathryn Tucker Windham, and Richard Zoellner; and contemporary works in varied media by Gary Chapman, Evan Wilson, Clifton Pearson, David Parrish, and many others.

*Our Shared Heritage* will be displayed in two parts, the first focusing on historical works in the collection, and the second featuring works by artists of the present day. A 60-page, fully illustrated catalogue will be published in April to provide a permanent record of the Museum's collection of Alabama art. Underwritten by a generous grant from the Alabama State Arts Council, the catalogue will be available for sale in the Museum

Store, and will also be distributed to museums, libraries and other educational institutions throughout Alabama to promote this important resource within the Huntsville Museum of Art's permanent collection.

# honse Mucha: Master of Art Nouveau March 24-June 23, 2019 | Huth, Boeing, Salmon, & Haws Galleries

<sup>his</sup> exhibition reveals Alphonse Mucha's willingness to experiment. It shows us a creative man exploring possibilities at a time when the emphasis was on defining a new art, fit for the new century. It examines the broad range of the artist's work in a variety of media, with a focus on the important works created during the 1890s.

The Art Nouveau style flourished and waned relatively quickly between 1890 and the start of World War I in 1914. European artists, affected by changing values and the war, had pushed the limits of art in many new ways and styles since the turn of the century. The decorative and representational elements of Art Nouveau began to seem old-fashioned when confronted by more avant-garde styles like Cubism, Fauvism, and Expressionism.

While admired for its beauty, Mucha's work was often relegated to footnotes in the evolution of modern art. In the 1960s, however, the spirit of nature and freedom that blossomed in the youth counterculture or "hippie" movement looked back to Art Nouveau for inspiration. The "Mucha Style" re-appears frequently during this period, in posters, fashion, album covers and more.

Mucha is most often remembered for the prominent role he played in shaping the aesthetics of French Art Nouveau at the turn of the 20th century. In commercial work, he used the seductive qualities of beautiful women to attract an audience and to sell the products he was hired to promote. In historical paintings, he imbued images with grandeur and mystery.

Presented in this exhibition are 75 works by Mucha including

rare original lithographs and proofs, an oil painting, drawings, a pastel, books, posters, portfolios and ephemera. The exhibition is curated by esteemed art historian, Gabriel Weisberg, Professor of Art History at the University of Minnesota, with the artwork coming from the Dhawan Collection in Los Angeles, California.

"Mucha's ability to understand the major creative themes of the day, to use them in the most original ways possible, and to create works of art that remain seductive for future generations, is truly his great triumph," writes Weisberg.

Beautiful and spiritual, commercial and idealistic, Mucha's

art is much more complex than a first look would indicate. Bringing together this unique collection, the Dhawans have given us an opportunity to re-evaluate one of the most fascinating artists of the last 150 years.

World Trade Center. For more than eight hours, his calm, steady reporting helped FOX viewers comprehend the multiple tragedies unfolding live in New York, Virginia and Pennsylvania.

Throughout his tenure at the network, Jon has gone into the field to cover events ranging from the war in Afghanistan to hurricanes and floods, space shuttle launches and royal weddings. He also provided live coverage of the launch of Operation Iragi Freedom from CENTCOM, Qatar, as well as President Bush's subsequent address to the nation aboard the USS Abraham Lincoln.

Prior to joining FOX News Channel, Scott was a correspondent for Dateline NBC and received an Emmy Award for

newswriting. He also served as a reporter for Inside Edition. He began his career as an anchor and reporter at stations in Miami and Denver.

A father of four, including a West Point graduate who recently returned from Afghanistan, Jon is a frequent speaker at events honoring veterans and our military service personnel. A Colorado native, he graduated from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He's a private pilot, an avid outdoorsman, a woodworker and a really bad golfer.

### Ambassador Andrew Young, Jr.

ndrew J. Young, Jr. has lived his life in service, from his ordination as a minister, to his work on behalf of civil and human rights, to his public service career as a member of Congress, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations and Mayor of Atlanta.

Young worked alongside Dr. King, and following his death, became executive vice president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. In subsequent years, Young was elected to the House of Representatives where he focused on programs for the poor, educational initiatives and human rights.

He was chosen by President Jimmy Carter to serve as the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations. While Ambassador, he advocated for human rights on a global



scale. Young was elected as Mayor of Atlanta in 1981 and served for two terms, during which time he succeeded in his campaign to bring the 1996 Olympic Games to Atlanta.

As an esteemed civil rights activist and noted author, Young has received accolades that include the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People's Springarn Medal.

At the Voices of Our Times event, Ambassador Young will be interviewed by Jim Ralph, the Rehnquist Professor of American History and Culture at Middlebury College, VT. Ralph specializes in American History, particularly the Civil Rights Movement. Ralph is the author of Northern Protest: Martin Luther King, Jr., Chicago, and the Civil Rights Movement (Harvard University Press, 1993), and is a co-editor of, and contributor to, The Chicago Freedom Movement: Martin Luther King Jr. and Civil Rights Activism in the North (University Press of Kentucky, 2016).

Nina Campbell is one of the world's most respected and influential interior designers. Her design expertise is unparalleled and her client list reads like an international "who's who." Renowned for her contagious wit and brilliant sense of personal style, her interiors appeal to both young and old and work perfectly in both contemporary and traditional settings.

She started her design career at the age of 19 when she worked as an assistant to John Fowler at the prestigious Sybil Colefax & John Fowler Company. In 1970 she and club owner, Mark Birley, opened Campbell & Birley, a shop in London specializing in "unashamed luxury." It was here that Nina launched her signature 'hearts' design and this timeless motif is still available on a range of fine bone china.



In 1972, Campbell set up her own business where one of her first commissions was to decorate Cullen House in Scotland. The opening of Nina's shop and design studio in London followed in 1984 where she continued her fabric printing, as well as expanding her business into the wider decorative arena. In 1990, Nina launched the first of what was to become her annual fabric, wallpaper and trimming collections.

The interior design side of the business continued to flourish with many notable projects including the Savoy Hotel lobby (with David Linley), the Hotel Parc Victor Hugo in Paris, and the Groucho Club in London. In addition, she has published six books on design, including her most recent book, *Elegance and Ease* (Rizzoli 2018), written by Giles Kime with the forward by Carolina Herrera.

Highlights from her long list of awards include an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Middlesex 2001, the Royal Oak Timeless Design Award 2003 and Residential Designer of the Year 2010 from *IDFX Magazine*, the Brit Week Design Icon Award for her contributions to British design and the Legends Award celebrating distinguished individuals and corporations in the world of art and design from the Pratt Institute.

This year marks the 32nd annual Youth Art Month (YAM) Exhibition of student artwork on view at the Huntsville Museum of Art in the Adtran, Jurenko, Thurber and Women's Guild Galleries. This exhibition showcases nearly 200 exuberant works of art by youth in kindergarten through grade 12 from Huntsville City, Madison City, Madison County, Athens City, Limestone County, Decatur City, and Scottsboro City schools.

The Juried Art Teachers' Biennial, Congressional Art Competition (on view March 10-April 28), and VAA: Visual Arts Achievement Program District V Blue Ribbon Finalists (VAA on view March 10) exhibitions complement the student artwork this year. 


